Lighting the Church Before ElectricityPart 1: by Bud Michael

So, we might wonder what St. Matthew's worshipers did for lighting before electricity. What? What do you mean <u>BEFORE</u> electricity? Yes. Even though Thomas Edison invented a reliable light bulb in the 1880s, electricity in farms, churches and rural homes was rare until fifty years later. (We'll get to that story in Part 2.)

Before the mid-1920s many rural churches rarely had nighttime services. Some city churches might have had gas lighting if gas lines were installed along the city streets. Private system lighting was available but usually too expensive to own and operate for small rural churches.

In the Summer of 1920, St. Matthew's acquired four gas pressure lamps made in Wichita, Kansas by the Coleman Lamp Company. The lamps were part of a Church redecorating and remodeling project that included a new pulpit, pulpit furniture, fresh interior paint, and a new organ. Two of the lamps were donated by the Ladies Aid Society (Women's Fellowship), one was purchased by the congregation, and a third lamp was donated to the Church by Mrs. E.C. Shuford, in memory of her late father, Levi Shrum, on whose farm bricks for the Church were made.

These lamps, invented in 1909 and continuously improved upon became widely available by the 1920s. They were advertised as "twenty times brighter than an ordinary kerosene lamp". One feature of the lamp was an extension rod to enable the lamp to be hung from the ceiling. Because of our tall ceilings, the lamps were probably set on tall stands in the sanctuary. The hanging lamp might have been mounted above the pulpit.

To operate the lamp, fuel is added to the tank or fount (in the base of the lamp), a small hand pump is used to pressurize the fuel, and the delicate mantles are lit with the turn of a knob while applying a lit match. One lamp is about as bright as a

100-watt light bulb. The lamp will burn for several hours without further attention. Releasing the fount pressure turns off the lamp.

Once our sanctuary renovation is complete and the construction materials are removed, an example of these gas pressure lamps will be placed in our History Room for all to see and imag-



ine sitting near in the sanctuary on a dark afternoon or at a Christmas Eve service.
