

# My Story (God, MS, and Me)

As I sat in the choir loft at the church keyboard, the pastor asked for joys and concerns. I raised my hand and said, "Some of you know that I have something wrong with my brain." I could hear many of the choir members gasp and a stillness settle over the congregation, and I started to cry. "The doctors are 90 percent sure it is multiple sclerosis, but I have another test this week to confirm. I don't know what the future holds. Please keep me in your prayers." I had already had an MRI without contrast, and MRI with contrast, and was scheduled to have a lumbar puncture for confirmation. When I returned to the neurologist's office for the results, the physician's assistant looked at me as I entered her office, and calmly said, "You know what I am going to tell you." June, 2009, my official journey with Multiple Sclerosis began.

I had a hundred questions. I had already gotten a copy of the MRI reports from the imaging center. Both of my sisters are in the medical field, but they call me "Dr. Leegee", because I research medical topics on the internet constantly. I read article after article, and learned anything I could about MS and how it might affect my future. After all, I was a project manager for a fabrication company. I still had to visit job sites, and take measurements, go to meetings, computer drafting, check drawings, write correspondence, and do billings. At church, I had to be there every Sunday to play the hymns, and teach Sunday school. I needed my hands, my eyes, and especially my mind. Without those three things, I could not do what I had done for the majority of my life. I had watched rheumatoid arthritis slowly take away my active mother, and replace her with a woman dealing daily with pain. I did not want that to happen to me as well.

Like the immediate relaxation achieved from sinking into a hot tub of water, I was calm and serene that day when I got the official diagnosis. I was actually relieved, because I had suspected for many years that MS was the instigator behind all the pins and needles tingling, dizziness, headsensations, aches, and multiple bouts of "tendonitis". I had in fact asked two different doctors (one an orthopedist, and the other a neurologist) if MS could be the problem, and both had responded, "No." I will never forget the PA remarking that I was lucky it had been caught, because there would have most likely been a major event, such as losing my sight or ability to walk, the would have eventually led to the diagnosis. We made a plan of action, and started the process to get on a disease modifying drug. There is no cure for MS, but there are drugs that work to alter the immune system to fight the damage from the disease. I soon settled into a routine with daily injections.

I continued to work full time, play keyboard, and teach Sunday school; however, being diagnosed had changed me. I had gone to church all of my life, but I needed to do more. I needed God more. I decided to take the local lay speaker training offered by the Methodist church. I followed it up in 2010, and became a certified lay speaker in the Methodist church (Western NC Conference). Μv sermon was about prayer, and I told my story to my home

congregation. I have spoken many times since about many topics, discovering new things about God and myself along the way.

Multiple Sclerosis is an equal opportunity disease, affecting young and old. I was forty-four years old at the time of diagnosis. My neurologist estimated from the 24 lesions and 6 black holes on my last MRI that I most likely have had MS for over fifteen years. I am now on a new disease modifying therapy, and doing well. I still work full time as a project manager; I still play the keyboard and teach Sunday school every Sunday. My church family, who sat in stillness and shock as I asked for prayer that day five years ago, is still there as well, loving and supporting me with open hearts. I now have a new neurologist, but I have the same great physician that has been there since the beginning... God.

# Make Ornament Cookies!

Make Christmas ornament cookies to hang on your Christmas tree.




# You will need:

- package of refrigerated cookie dough
- \* rolling pin
- \* cookie cutters (star, bell, tree, etc.)
- \* cookie sheet
- \* icing
- \* a drinking straw
- \* ribbon
- \* an adult to help!

#### How to make them:

- 1. Roll out the dough and cut shapes with the cookie cutters.
- 2. Place on cookie sheet.
- 3. Use the straw to make a hole near the top of each cookie.
- 4. Bake according to the package directions. *Important: Have an adult help!*
- 5. When cool, decorate the cookies with icing and tie a ribbon through each hole.
- 6. Hang them on your tree or give them as gifts to friends!
